2nd Annual Meeting very successful

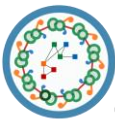
On May 14 – 16, SYSCILIA welcomed 47 consortium members and 4 Scientific Advisory Board members to the **second annual meeting** of the project at the Institute of Child Health in **London**.

The progress of the project and the latest results (some even finalized at the meeting) were presented by representatives of all workpackages, and these as well as future directions were critically and vividly discussed. The interactive way in which work was discussed and planned, resulted in the initiation of a “Project Shop” for which subjects were already discussed during the brain storm session on Wednesday. The participants were subdivided into 5 groups/topics and results, including timeline and lead partners, were presented at the end of the morning.

A very warm ‘thank you’ to all speakers for their exciting presentations, as well as for sharing their latest unpublished results, and to all participants for their fruitful discussions and ample willingness to foster new collaborations: you all made the meeting very successful!

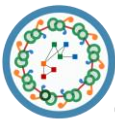
Their overall impression was very positive, and reflected the general open and positive character of our second annual meeting:

CILIA 2012 - Cilia in Development and Disease

The first international conference in Europe for the cilia scientific and clinical community initiated by the Ciliopathy Alliance and supported by SYSCILIA, took place in London on May 16-18, 2012, right after the SYSCILIA annual meeting. It was the first international scientific conference devoted to Cilia in Development and Disease, and had a massive response of over 280 registrants. An additional 50 applicants unfortunately had to be disappointed, as the maximum capacity of the venue at the UCL Institute of Child Health was reached.



On May 16 the Conference started with an evening reception with the Ciliopathy Alliance patient groups and VIP guests. Joe Gleeson gave his keynote talk at this evening.

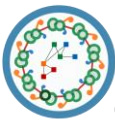
The Ciliopathy Alliance brings together patient support groups, researchers, doctors and allied health professionals representing patients and families living with and affected by **ciliopathies** - diseases caused by defects in the function of cilia.



On May 17 and 18, the cilia community was presented with an impressive line-up of both keynote speakers that represented the leaders in the cilia- and ciliopathy field and exciting papers selected for oral presentations from submitted abstracts. SYSCILIA was well-represented in both categories. In between the talks, about 150 posters of nearly equal high quality were presented, many of which contained unpublished work, which also made the scientific content of the conference of outstanding quality.

Pre-ARVO conference on Retinal Ciliopathies

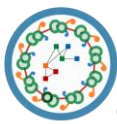
Just prior to the SYSCILIA annual meeting, on May 4-5, a more focused event was held as a pre-conference to the annual Association for Research in Vision and Ophthalmology (ARVO) meeting in Ft. Lauderdale, USA. This concerned the 14th Vision research Conference, with this year's theme "**Retina Ciliopathies, from Genes to Mechanisms and Treatment**", co-organized by **Marius Ueffing** who also chaired the session on non-syndromic retinal ciliopathies. SYSCILIA research was importantly presented in invited talks in the sessions focusing on "Cilia, Intraflagellar Transport and Disease" (**Karsten Boldt**), "Syndromic Ciliopathies" (**Nico Katsanis** and **Uwe Wolfrum**), and "Ciliary Systems Biology" (**Ronald Roepman**, also chair of this session). Ronald Roepman used this opportunity to inform the ciliary community about the concept of and progress made in SYSCILIA, which generated a lot of interest and inquiries to connect to the project.

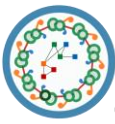
